

# The First Lesson: Wisdom of Solomon 3:1-9

<sup>1</sup> But the souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them.

<sup>2</sup> In the eyes of the foolish they seemed to have died, and their departure was thought to be a disaster,

<sup>3</sup> and their going from us to be their destruction; but they are at peace.

<sup>4</sup> For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality.

<sup>5</sup> Having been disciplined a little, they will receive great good, because God tested them and found them worthy of himself;

He will dwell with them as their God; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; <sup>4</sup> he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." <sup>5</sup> And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new." ## Gospel: John 11:32-44
